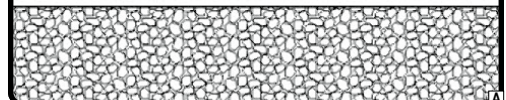

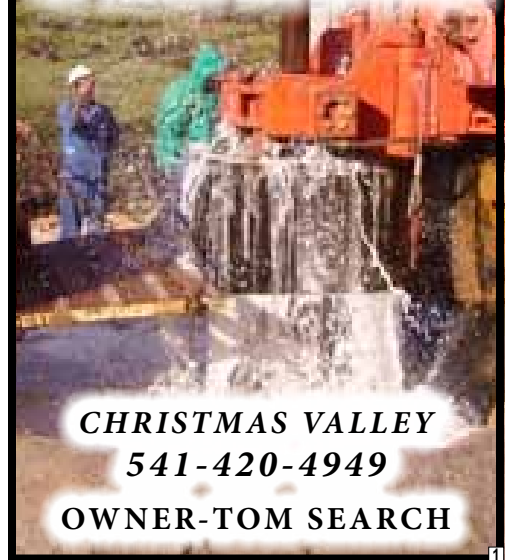

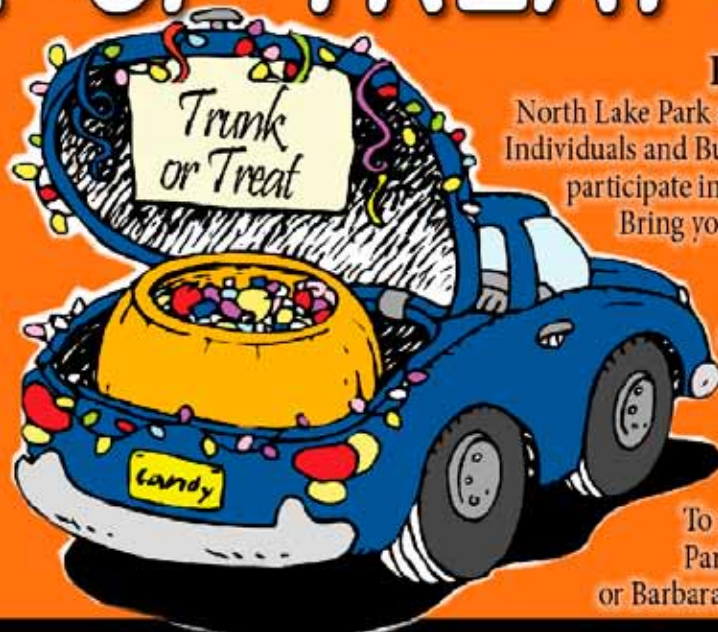

to Meet in Lakeview***Larisa Bogardis - BLM*

The Bureau of Land Management today announced it will hold a meeting of the Southeast Oregon Resource Advisory Council, demonstrating that partnerships and inclusion are vital to managing sustainable, working public lands. The public is welcome to attend the meeting which will occur on Monday and Tuesday, Oct. 16-17, at Lakeview Interagency Office from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday and 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Tuesday.

Planned agenda items at the meeting include field visits to the Beaty Butte Wild Horse Training Center and a local sunstone mine; new tribal consultation guidelines; sage grouse; fuels reduction; and the 2017 wildfire season.

"The Southeast Oregon Resource Advisory Committee is an asset to its federal members," said Vale District Manager Don Gonzalez. "We are able to draw from members' expertise and community connections to better address resource issues."

A half-hour comment period, during which the public may address the RAC, will begin at noon Tuesday. Depending on the number of people wishing to comment and time available, the amount of time for individual oral comments may be limited.

Resource Advisory Councils are critical in assisting the BLM in continuing to be a good neighbor in the communities we serve. The 14-member RAC provides advice and recommendations to the BLM on resource and land management issues within the BLM Lakeview, Vale and Burns districts.

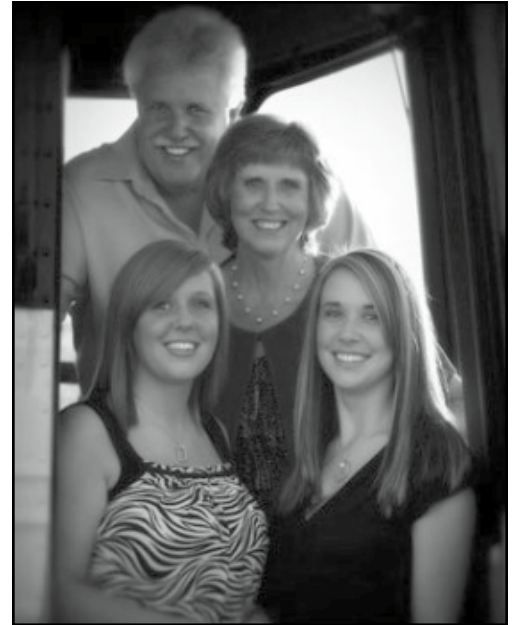

Back in Thyme Herbas: Essential Oils “Birch”

Birch oil has a strong, penetrating aroma, which people recognize as wintergreen. Though the two are unrelated, they are almost identical in chemical constituents. The chemical constituents are Esters (99%): methyl salicylate, betulene, and betulinol. American Indians and early European settlers drank teas flavored with birch bark and wintergreen. According to Julia Lavwless, “This has been translated into a preference for ‘root beer’ flavorings.” A synthetic methyl salicylate is now widely used as a flavoring agent, especially in root beer, chewing gum, and toothpaste. Birch’s common primary uses are: for cartilage injury, muscle aches, muscle development, muscle tone, and whiplash. These are all topical applications. French medicinal uses included: a treatment of rheumatism, muscle pain, cramps, arthritis, tendonitis, hypertension, and inflammation. Its properties are analgesic, anti-inflammatory, anti-rheumatic, antiseptic, antispasmodic, disinfectant, diuretic, stimulant (bone-liver), and warming. Birch may be beneficial for acne, edema, reducing fevers, bladder infections, cystitis, dropsy, eczema, gallstones, gout, infection, discomfort in joints, draining and cleansing the lymphatic system, obesity, osteoporosis, skin diseases, and urinary tract disorders. It is known for its ability to alleviate bone pain. It has a cortisone-like action due to the high content of methyl salicylate.

The aromatic value is that it influences, elevates, opens, and increases awareness in the sensory system. There are no oral dietary supplement uses. Do not use while pregnant or by people with epilepsy. Blends well with: basil, bergamot, cypress, geranium, lavender, lemongrass, marjoram, and peppermint.

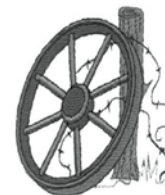

Every school year starts with excitement and great expectations. But this year so far has been better than many! We have had a terrific start with positive attitudes, improved attendance and just a great attitude in

the halls and classrooms. I appreciate our students and staff doing the little things in making the start of this year so positive and enjoyable.

Changes: Shirley Brown, our front office receptionist retired over the summer. Tracey Fivecoat has taken over that position. Suzanne Morehouse, an educational assistant for over 33 years, also retired. Mark Russell has been hired to fill that position. Audrey Arballo has replaced Tracey in the library and Dewanna Dial was hired to assume Audrey's previous educational assistant duties. Our social studies teacher, Andrew Shawcroft, resigned his position here. He has married and moved to Europe! We have hired Lance Haberly to fill that position. Mr. Haberly has taught English and social studies for many years, at Siuslaw High School in Florence, and has previously officiated basketball here at North Lake.

School Report Card: Our school report card will be released by the Oregon Department of Education (ODE) in October. This report card for the 2016-17 school year shows a drop in student achievement in most testing areas not only at North Lake but statewide. Many of other states who use *Smarter Balanced* are also experiencing this drop. At the present time the cause is unknown, but is being researched vigorously. We will have more information on this as we receive it.

Enrollment: Our enrollment is stable. We are currently at 215 students in K-12. That number will fluctuate all year as you know due to a very mobile population.

Track: We broke ground last October and by mid-October this year we believe the project will be completed. We are currently laying the rubber topping and when the lines are painted we will have a new ready for competition track facility! The construction does require us to work around some inconveniences - but it will be worth it.

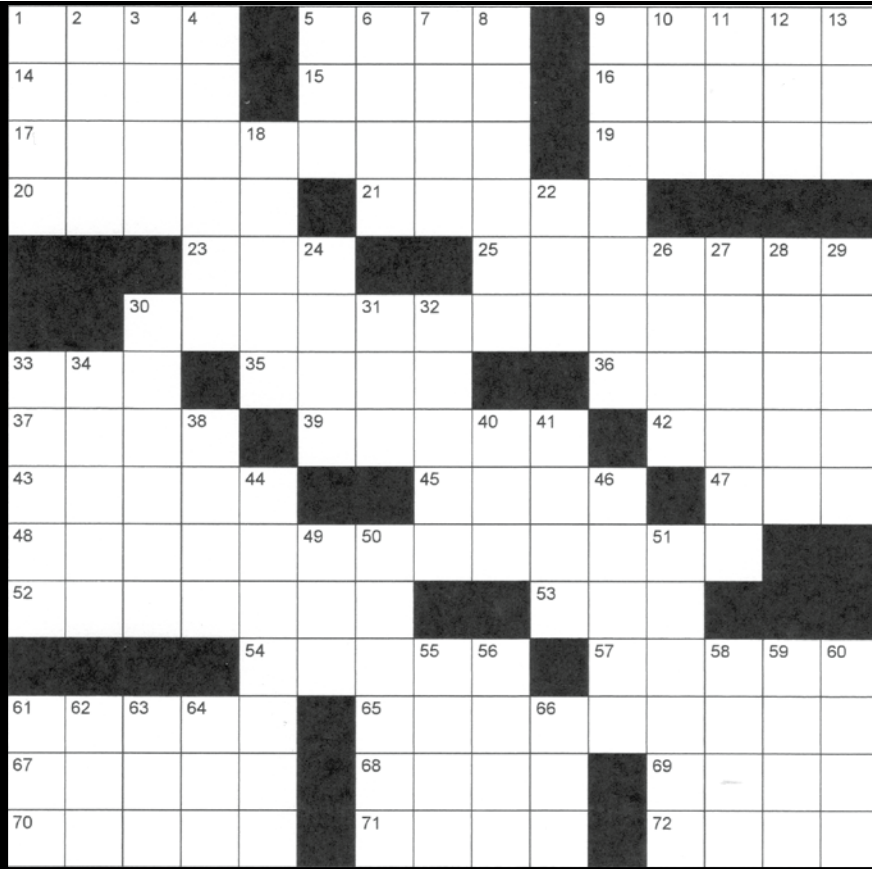

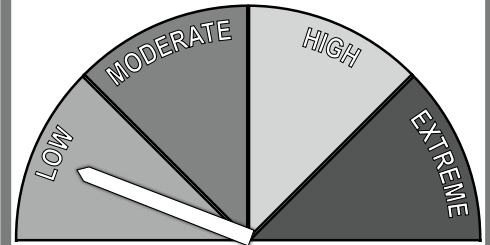

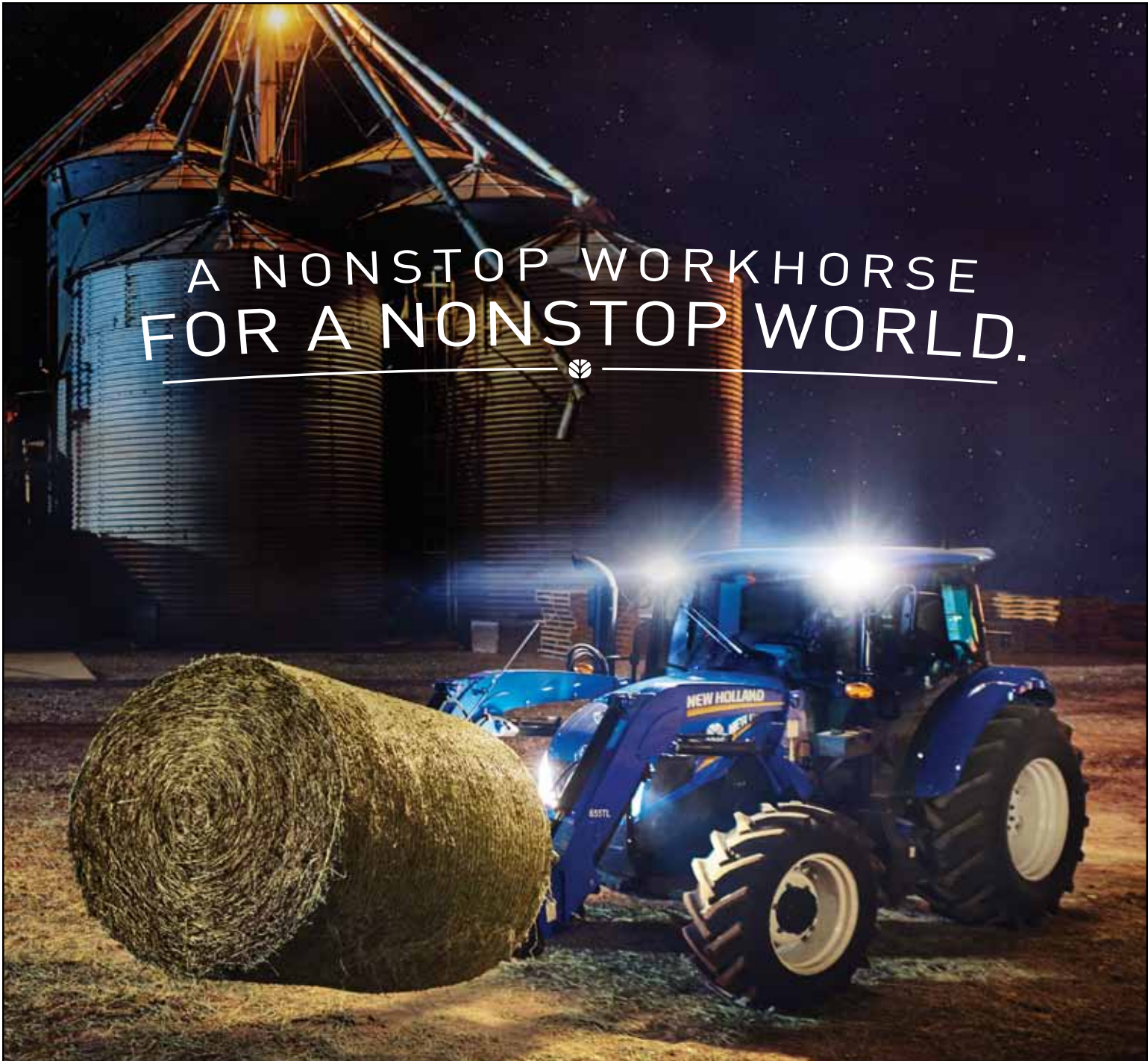
