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





Hot Weather, Hot Horses

Everyone can agree this has been a HOT summer so far. So let's talk about keeping your horses cool. This is pretty much common sense. What the weather advisories say we humans should do in hot weather, the same is true for your hot horses.

Water: Make sure your horse's water supplies are clean, and that there is plenty of it. A hot horse is sweating constantly and they will require much more water than they do on a cool day in December. You can offer water with electrolytes added, but make sure they have plain water also. Fluffy may not like "Gatorade" and may decide to die of dehydration before drinking it. We don't mean the human drink with electrolytes — you know we're talking about the powders you can buy at the feed store that are intended for large animals.

Shade: Yep, it makes a huge difference. If you are relying on trees to provide shade, make sure the shade is actually in the pasture all day, and not on the other side of the fence all afternoon. Without shade on very hot days, your horse may not be able to cool itself enough by sweating, to avoid heat stroke.

Rest: Don't work horses during the hottest part of the day. If you must, keep it to a minimum. Better yet, get up early and work your horse in the cool hours around dawn, or after it cools down in the evening. This is where the common sense thing comes into play.

Playing with Hoses: Hosing horses off is a nice way to cool them off, but scrape the excess water off when you are done. If you have a mister... perfect. The cooling happens from evaporation of water on the skin and if they are soaking wet that evaporation doesn't work so well. This is because the water on the hair has to evaporate or drain off before the water next to

the skin will start to dry. Your dog knows about that, it's why they'll shake off after taking a dip.

Fans: We're big fans of fans. They make a nice breeze, AND they discourage weak flying insects (culicoides) from making a snack out of your horse. Just be careful not to plug in too many for your barn's wiring, or leave cords where they can be nibbled on.

Trim Time: If you have a particularly hairy horse — oldsters with Cushing's or babies with all their fuzz, consider clipping them. Not too short or they'll get sunburned, but enough that they can appreciate the nice box fan you've hung in their stall. And speaking of sunburn, watch out for horses with white hair, especially on noses and eyes. Try child-safe sunscreen or fly masks to cover those sensitive areas. If all their white areas blister there might be more going on and they should be seen by the vet (think liver issues).

Just Like Pets in Cars: Don't leave your horses in a trailer in the sun. It's hot. It's stuffy and there is no breeze. If you don't want to stand in the trailer, don't make Fluffy do it.





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Smokey Air and Heat <u>May Cause Problems</u>

Public health officials want to remind people across the state to take precautions as smoke from multiple wildfires around Oregon and Washington affect the air quality. The combination of high temperatures and wildfire smoke around area may increase the risk of illness especially for older adults, young children, and people with asthma, respiratory, or heart conditions.

Officials urge all residents to take the following precautions to avoid health problems during hot, smoky conditions. Reduce the amount of time spent outdoors. This can usually provide some protection, especially in a tightly closed, air-conditioned house in which the air conditioner can be set to re-circulate air instead of bringing in outdoor air. Reduce the amount of time engaged in vigorous outdoor physical activity. This can be an important and effective strategy to decrease exposure to inhaled air pollutants and minimize health risks during a smoke event. Reduce other sources of indoor air pollution such as burning cigarettes and candles; using gas, propane, and wood burning stoves and furnaces; cooking; and vacuuming.

Individuals with heart disease or lung diseases such as asthma should follow their health care providers' advice about prevention and treatment of symptoms. Remember to stay hydrated. Drink between 2-4 cups of water per hour if working outdoors. Apply sunscreen with SPF15 or more 10 minutes before going out; reapply every two hours. Wear loose, lightweight, light-colored clothing. Take cool showers to lower your body temperature. Never leave infants, children, or pets in a parked car. Always wear a life jacket if you are on the water. Remember to be safe around water. Check on at-risk friends. family, and neighbors. Know symptoms of Heat Exhaustion (heavy sweating, weakness, pale and clammy, fainting and vomiting). Know symptoms of Heat Stroke (high body temperature, hot and dry skin, rapid pulse) and call for help.

A 14 acre fire on August 23 near the north end of Rainbow Road in Christmas Valley, and the 90 acre Lost Forest Fire have both contributed to air quality in the north end of the county to be near an alltime low. But, even without these nearby blazes, there has been enough smoke in the air to literally choke a horse. Fires from around the state seem to be sending all their smoke here, to our high-desert valley basin.

You can gauge the "thickness" of the air by making simple visual observations. If you can see Table Rock, it's a pretty good day. When Table Rock disappears, look for the Black Hills. When the Black Hills are not visible, look for Water-Tank Ridge. When the water tank is rendered invisible by smoke, you know it's bad. Some days, in some places, you can't see half a mile down the road.

Most summers during fire season, there is a build-up of smoke in the air. But this summer seems especially bad. Take care of yourself. See the article on page 18. Take care of your animals. Take care of your kids. I know the athletic coaches at North Lake School have been altering their train-

Policy: Animals on Park and Rec Properties

North Lake Park and Recreation District has adopted a policy concerning pets/ animals on Park and Rec properties. This policy is an attempt to keep our facilities an enjoyable place for all users.

When on North Lake Park and Recreation property (including the Rodeo Grounds, Golf Course, Play Area, ect.) all domestic animals, whether pets, livestock, or other, must be leashed and/or under the direct control and supervision of their owner/handler. Animals freely roaming, with no apparent owner/handler in the area may be treated as strays. The proper authorities will then be contacted.
