



Donkeys, Burrows, Jacks and Jennets

snags, stings or bites, but burros are well suited to the rigors of the place - incredibly tough animals. Make no mistake! These aren't Farmer Brown's donkeys! These are 1000 pound wild animals capable of defending against rattlers, coyotes, cougars & jaguars. One time, after close inspection, I picked an innocent looking cactus fruit - for two days afterward I was plucking micro-

scopic spines out of my hands. Burros actu-

ally eat these, and the cactus, spines and all!

There was a distinct growl from under the motorhome. Not one of those, "What was that?" growls, this was a, "WHAT THE #@\$%&*\$#@ WAS THAT!" type of growl. Of course it had to be right in the middle of night in an unfamiliar place, the upper Sonora desert in South-Central Arizona. This was years ago, our first time here - everything was unfamiliar - towering cacti, unfamiliar bird and animal calls, border patrol and border-runners, cougars and jaguars, and a few thousand members of the Tohono O'odham Tribe.

I'd just heard about the sighting of a jaguar over near Tucson, and another reported near here by a local Indian hunter. Now I step outside for a little air, only to have this growl set what's left of my hair standing straight up! I'm twenty feet from the Winnebago waiting for something big to happen. I wait... nothing. Slowly I walked back to the door.... nothing. I open it, and as I'm climbing the steps, from right below my feet, comes a long "GRRRR!" I enter the living room like the devil is nipping my heels, and slam the door with lethal force. It's too late to be cool, my wife looks alarmed, "WHAT WAS THAT?"

It didn't take long to find the answer in the form of a wild donkey grazing wildflowers right behind the RV! Who knew they could GROWL? This was just the first of a long series of little donkey adventures to occur during our many visits to the western edge of the Tohono O'odham Nation, most involving some quiet moment when I think I'm alone, suddenly shattered by the loudspeaker trumpet of a donkey's displeasure.

In this region the words donkey and burro are used interchangeably. It might be more correct to say, "wild asses", but that would cause my dear Aunts to blush, so we'll go with donkey or burro. A male is called a jack, and a female is a jenny or jennet.

Since escaping from Spanish explorers over 400 years ago, the burros have thrived in the strikingly harsh environment of the Sonora Desert. Anything living here, whether animal, plant, people, even rocks must be as tough as... well, rocks! It gets so hot the rocks actually sweat, forming an attractive outer coat called "desert-varnish". Everywhere are stark reminders: This is no place for weakness. I sat one day to eat my lunch near a little cottontail rabbit resting in the shade of a creosote bush. The following day, passing the same spot, I found only his leg - so much for lucky rabbit's feet!

In the desert nearly everything pokes,

Water is a commodity of hot contention in the Sonora desert. When I first came here I started filling a large bowl with water each day to attract birds. As it turned out, most of the water (if not slurped up by a passing coyote or donkey) would be consumed, oddly enough, by honey bees. These are hybridized bees, called "killer bees" by some people - they are high strung and easily agitated.

On a hot afternoon when the water bowl was getting low something interesting happened. A fight broke out between a flock of thirsty finches and several dozen bees! The bees were swarming the water bowl preventing the finches from drinking. The birds started killing bees. This brought more bees. Overwhelmed, the finches would back off to a nearby mesquite tree, mass their forces, then fly to the bowl in a frenzy to kill bees. The drama escalated to the point where it seemed prudent for me to retreat. A half hour later there were hundreds of dead bees, and one dead bird beside the nearly empty bowl. I took a short nap, and by the time I awoke something had eaten all the bees, the bird, and drank the last of the water.

Back in Thyme Herbals: Thyme

THYME - *Thymus Vulgaris L.* common thyme, garden thyme of the mint family

No cook needs to be told how to use thyme; be it fresh or dried, combined with parsley and bay leaves, it makes a distinctive aromatic flavoring to almost any dish from soups to salads, but little is known about the medicinal values. In Medieval times it symbolized courage, and to keep up the spirits, knights departing for the Crusades received scarves embroidered with a sprig of thyme from their ladies. A popular belief was that a leaf tea prevented nightmares, while another held that a tea made from thyme and other herbs enabled one to see nymphs and fairies.

Herbalists of the Middle ages regarded thyme as a stimulant and antispasmodic and recommended sleeping on thyme and inhaling it as a remedy for melancholy and epilepsy. In 1725 a German apothecary discovered the plants essential oil contains a powerful disinfectant called thymol, effective against bacteria and fungi. It also acts as an expectorant, loosening phlegm in the respiratory tract so that it can be coughed out. It was listed later for these uses and a remedy for numerous other complaints, including diarrhea and fever. The oil was prescribed externally as an antiseptic for fungal infections such as athlete's foot. Thyme is used now for an anti-inflammitory, for coughs, bronchitis, upper respiratory mucus, sore throats and cholic. Genital vulvar lichen scerosis has been treated successfully in prepubertal girls with a cream containing thyme extract. Thyme is an antiraicrobal, antiseptic, uterine stimulant, and vulenerary.

Dioscorides says the Egyptians called a variety of the plant "meroupyos", and a thyme species called "saem" was found in the tomb of Tutankhamun. Thyme grows in Egypt today. Apiciurs used the herb in several recipies as an important flavoring for Mediterranian cooking. Thyme honey from the slopes of Hymettos Hills in Greece

to go days without water. They can lose 100 to 200 pounds of body weight, and replenish it with a few minutes of drinking. They are smart too! Before the tribe started supplying them with a waterhole, the donkeys learned to turn on the faucets in the park. Course they don't turn them off, so you wake up to a lake. I caught about 8 donkeys one night, huddled, drinking around a faucet they vandalized. When they saw me coming they all ran like a bunch of teenagers, and hid behind one small mesquite tree, making worried noises. When I turned the water off, they groaned with disappointment. I laughed so hard I cried - always wished I had a film of the event.

In the roughly 6 square miles of desert between us, and the nearby Pozo Redondo Mountains, there are usually three or four herds of burros each comprised of an alpha jack, three to ten jennets, possibly one or two adolescent jacks, and the current crop of babies. With calls that can be heard for miles, the herds occasionally sound off to keep track of each other's location. This helps them avoid trouble when mating tensions are high. It also allows them to keep track of where others have grazed the days bounty of Spring plants - a luxury they gorge on after a Winter spent grazing the less nutritious: mesquite, cactus & ocotillo.

Elaborate conversations are held around the waterhole 500 feet from camp. Time, and time again it goes like this: When a group approaches, the jack trumpets from several hundred feet out. If a group is at the waterhole the conversation begins:

Jack#1:"WE ARE ALREADY HERE! DRINKING! YOU MUST WAIT! STAY AWAY, I'M VERY ANGRY & TOUGH!"

Jack#1: "I AM NOT AFRAID! I KNOW YOU. I CHASED AND BIT YOU ONCE! YOU KICK LIKE A GIRL!"

Jack#2: "THIS TIME YOU WILL LOSE! I'M VERY ANGRY AND READY TO FIGHT!"

Jack#1: "OK! OK! HOLD YOUR HORS-ES. WE WILL MOVE, BUT I AM PEE-ING HERE SO YOU KNOW THIS PLACE IS MINE! HERE ARE SOME BIS-**CUITS TOO!**"

The group at the water hole doesn't wish to leave - the alpha jack has to get after his own clan to get them moving. He's irritated now. From behind he gives the slowpokes little bites, and bellows with impatience. One of the females doesn't like being rushed - she responds by kicking him square in the chest - the blow might have put me in the hospital - he barely notices. As the jacks pass they shout insults, and make threatening gestures.

Normally, donkeys are curious about humans from a distance, but afraid up close. But during the Spring the jacks get aggressive. They give warnings by growling and braying from a distance - occasionally they will come closer to make big display. One dark night I was standing outside in the porch light. Out in the darkness the sound of hooves galloping my way - suddenly from the mesquite trees a large jack charged into the light. Stopping in the middle of the gravel drive, he planted his hooves with legs spread stiff, ears back, and went on an earsplitting tirade of braying, dropping down to growls, which dribbled off into a series of low whining curses, as if trying to explain how angry I had made him feel. I just stood still with an air of indifference. After staring at me for a full minute the ears came up, and he suddenly walked away like he forgot his train of thought. Not waiting to be told twice, I headed inside.

As I write, it is March in the Sonora. Spring is in the air, forming a sweet green blanket of sprouts in the low spots and the sheltered sandy corners of the desert. The barrel and cholla cactus, saguaros, hedgehog cactus, and organ pipe cactus are taking on a glowing hue of newly formed spikesn-spines. All Creation has mating on the brain. The ravens pair off to perform artful high elevation courtship displays. While

based perrenials and sub-shrubs, belonging to the eurasian genus, which grows mainly on dry grassland and calcareous soils. Although tiny, the numerous flowers produce copious nectar, making them important as bee plants. They hybridize freely in cultivation.

Most widely used are *T. Vulgaris*, *T.X. citriodoras* and their cultivars. The main medicinals are *T. serpyllum* and *T. vulgaris*. Thyme is the best herb for stimulating the thymus, a gland of the immune system.

It is a great pick-me-up for low energy. Its antispasmodic properties are useful for lung problems and convulsive coughs such as whooping cough. It's an excellent remedy for sore throats (mixed with sage), head colds (with horseraddish) and stiffness related to chills. Thyme also helps to stimulate the body's natural defence and combined with echinacea boosts the immune system.

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
