Lakeview BLM offering sage grouse lek tours

LAKEVIEW, Ore. — The Bureau of Land Management is offering a series of guided tours of sage brush steppe areas during the upcoming sage-grouse breeding season. Participants will have the opportunity to learn how the Greater Sage-grouse serves as a barometer for rangeland health while also witnessing their fascinating springtime courtship rituals.

The Bureau of Land Management is committed to keeping public landscapes healthy and productive, in part by managing the sage brush steppe for a variety of uses, including ranching, hunting, mining and energy development.

The sage-grouse breeding season, also known as lekking, takes place for only four to six weeks in early spring at gathering sites called leks. Sage-grouse come to approximately 100 lek sites across Lake County to perform their courtship dance before breeding.

Guided tours will be offered to the public on March 10 and April 7, 2018. Viewing is limited to 20 people per tour in order to minimize the potential for disturbance to the sage-grouse. Reservations are on a first-come, first-serve basis. To reserve a spot, contact Larisa Bogardus at 541)-947-6237 or lbogardus@blm.gov by noon on Friday, March 9, for the March 10 tour or by noon on Friday, April 6 for the April 7 outing.

Viewers will depart at 6 a.m. from the BLM Lakeview District Office, 1301 South G Street, in Lakeview, Oregon. Carpooling is encouraged. Transportation may be provided depending on the number of participants, who should dress appropriately for field conditions. Sturdy, broken-in boots/shoes are encouraged, as participants will encounter rocky, rugged terrain, with sagebrush and rocks. Additionally, tours will require a hike of up to a half mile. There are no amenities and no restrooms. Participants should also plan to bring plenty of water, a hat, sunglasses, and sunscreen.

LETS TALK SOLAR

Citizens at the North End of Lake County Are as usual The last to Be Informed Submitted by Terry Crawford

So here we go again. Information important to the citizens living in Lake County's north-end communities are the last to know. Is it their fault? Yes, because they chose not to subscribe to or purchase every issue of The Lake County Examiner - the county's paper of record. However, entities such as Obsidian Solar Center, LLC, (knowing full well that the folks in the north end get most of their information via The Desert Whispers and The Community Breeze) chose not to offer information to the public in these publications - they don't have to. But that doesn't mean that they can not.

It is the age old game of blind siding - of using laws to short circuit the publics right to actively participate in a process through submitting their input and comments within the perimeters of the public comment period.

Obsidian Solar filed their notice of intent on January 16, 2018 with the Oregon Department of Energy (ODOE). The ODOE placed a public notice in the Examiner on February 7th, 2018. This notice included the fact that there was a 30 day public comment period. ODOE was told that the Examiner had full coverage of the county but they did fail to do due diligence as they

are mandated to place notices in all local publications. Regardless, the damage was done.

ODOE in conjunction with Obsidian offered an informational meeting regarding the 7000 acre proposed solar site on March 6, 2018 - only three days before the public comment period ended. At this meeting Kellen Tardaewether, Senior Siting Analyst said she would try to get the comment period extended. I e-mailed her a request to extend the period beyond the next publication dates of the local papers such that we at the north end were extended reasonable accommodation to get their concerns, comments and even possible solutions submitted. There are more chances to comment but they are not where they would get the most attention.

If you want to comment you need to submit them in writing and they must address one or more of the specific Exhibits listed below as these are issues that Obsidian is required to address. The process is complicated and please understand that they are not looking for comments such as I'm for it or against it, but rather comments that target issues in the Exhibit list.







Any defecation (poop) from the animal must be cleaned up immediately by the owner/handler. Individuals failing to comply with this policy will be asked to leave Park and Rec property.

Animals freely roaming, with no apparent owner/handler in the area may be treated as strays. The proper authorities will then be contacted.





BLM Advisory Council to meet in Burns Oregon

BURNS, Ore. – The Bureau of Land Management today announced it will hold a meeting of the Southeast Oregon Resource Advisory Council. The public is welcome to attend the meeting, which will occur on Thursday and Friday, March 15 and 16, at the Burns Paiute Tribe Gathering Center, 40 PaSiGo Street, Burns, Ore., beginning at 8 a.m. each day.

Resource Advisory Councils provide advice and recommendations necessary for the BLM to consider resource and land management issues within the agency. BLM maintains 38 chartered advisory committees located in the West. Řesource Advisory Committees are sounding boards for BLM initiatives, regulatory proposals and policy changes. Each citizen-based council consists of 10 to 15 members from diverse interests in local communities. They assist in the development of committee recommendations that address public land management issues. Resource councils are critical in assisting the BLM in continuing to be a good neighbor in the communities that the agency serves.

Planned agenda items at the meeting include Lands With Wilderness Characteristics designation, sage-grouse management and programs, the national Wild Horse and Burros program, and cross-boundary fuel breaks.

"The diversity of members of the Southeast Oregon RAC's membership provides us with valuable feedback from a broad range of stakeholders, which is very helpful to the BLM in meeting its multiple use mission," Burns District Manager Jeff Rose said. "These volunteers work very hard to familiarize themselves with our work and to find common ground and consensus on sensitive issues."

A half-hour comment period, during which the public may address the RAC, will begin at 11:15 a.m. Friday, March 16. Depending on the number of people wishing to comment and time available, the amount of time for individual oral comments may be limited.

BACK IN THYME

INDIAN HERBOLOGY OF NORTH AMERICA

FOODS FROM MOTHER EARTH:

Original Americans naturally, depending on the forests, plains, and coastal regions, and existed for many generations. Indians used wild species as plant food. Weather and season permitting, a variety of game and fish were utilized as food, clothing, instruments, and decoration. All kinds of berries were gathered in spring and eaten as spring medicine or for specific treatments and as general blood builders. Cranberries in autumn were blood and liver boosters. Blackberry roots were astringent. Nuts were a main source of high nutrition and used for nut bread, or crushed with water added for nut milk. Acorn and dandelion roots were roasted, pounded, and sprinkled over other cooked roots. Pond lily roots were one of the most widely used from eastern Canada to the Pacific coast. sugar was made from milkweed roots, gathered while the dew was still on the leaves. The white portion of hardwood ashes, as well as certain leaves were used for salt. Apples and other fruits and vegetables were stored in bins and buried for the winter, some were sliced, hung and dried for use later.

Yucca leaves and Quillaja bark made soap and shampoo. Although the Indian way of life has vanished, we should remember, a considerable number of elements have been taken over and incorporated by the white man, including growing of corn, squash, pumpkins, and tobacco. Man esteems himself happy when that which is food is also his medicine. Indians at one time were a people of complete accord, for they practiced it daily in many ways! Europeans from the beginning were impressed by the alert, brave, strong, robust stamina of the Indians. Technical study confirms their physical endurance and in most cases cannot find any of our modern

day bone deficiency, cavities, arthritis, tuberculosis, etc. Studies of the earliest travelers and missionaries found Americans very healthy and free of diseases, finding only eighty-seven different sicknesses spoken of. It was uncommon to have fatal cancer, TB, and heart conditions, all of which have progressed in our times. Modern lists are over 30,000 invented names of diseases, and growing every day! In history Indian women were strong, but today with the introduction of white man diseases, they are weaker than the white women and need more attention.

Civilization has taught us to count on Life Insurance companies, numerous research, welfare, old age organizations, etc. In comparison, the Indians protection came from NATURE, the "MOTHER EARTH" being most important. They learned to treat with plant life, the medicine from the earth.

After the white man came, the new way of life brought white man diseases for which they had no built up immunity, and thousands died, Self sufficiency died as the Indians became dependent on civilized ways. Some of the Elders of the Indians remember a few of the family and tribal herbs----that most white men think of as troublesome, insignificant weeds, but to them, they bring out medicinal uses from experience we have yet to identify. The Indians were never at a loss as which plant was best, or when to gather them for the healing of diseases. They knew how to treat complaints of surgical, physical, and midwifery with a skill that surpasses the medical teachings. They used vapor baths and sweat lodges of almost stifling amounts of moist heat to eliminate toxic conditions. roots were pounded fine for poultices for bad cuts or sprains. such as plague, TB, typhoid, cancer, ulcers, heart and mental diseases were uncommon among early communities.

Did you know, we spend millions of dollars for weed control, booklets on various plants and how to destroy them? If we were educated on how to use them medicinally, we could help ourselves physically as well as tax wise!


