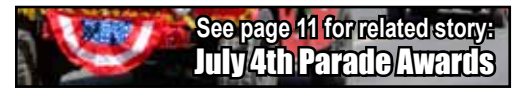

Pursuant to ORS 198.550 (3) the following Emergency Ordinance was read and adopted by the Christmas Valley Domestic Water Supply District Board of Commissioners on July 10, 2017.

BE IT RESOLVED: that due to problems with a pump and recent fire activity causing a serious water shortage within our system The Christmas Valley Domestic Water Supply District Board of Commissioners hereby orders that effective July 10, 2017 there can be NO outside irrigation between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. Additionally there can be NO outside irrigation on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

A copy of this Ordinance is available for public inspection at the Water District office, 87379 Holly Lane, Christmas Valley, Oregon and at the office of the Lake County Clerk, 513 Center Street, Lakeview, Oregon.

Penalties for violation of this Ordinance are provided under ORS 198.600 (1) (2) (3).

Ana Fire Update: July 14, 2017

YESTERDAY'S OPERATIONS: Firefighters continued to secure the perimeter, patrolled the fire, and finished grading Forest Road 2901. A group of engines, one bulldozer, one crew and a supervisor were available to respond to any new fires in the area. Crews along with two excavators performed repair work along the fire perimeter to restore forest and range land impacted from firefighting activities. Developed by local agency advisors, this work includes; repairing containment lines, scattering brush and slash piles from chainsaw operations, knocking down berms, constructing water bars to mitigate erosion, and restoring any damaged trails.

TODAY'S OPERATIONS: Although fire management officials expect 100 percent containment by the end of shift today, smoke from large woody debris, posing no threat to containment lines, may still be seen within the fire area. Fire suppression repair work will be focused along Forest Road 2901, Winter Rim and in the area above Summer Lake Store. Fire managers anticipate all repair work to be completed by the end of shift today. The National Weather Service has issued a Red Flag Warning for the fire area due to dry and unstable conditions, which will

support extreme fire behavior and rapid rates of spread to any new or uncontrolled wildfires. Despite the red flag warning, fire officials expect little to no increase in fire activity on the Ana Fire. A slight chance of thunderstorms on Saturday could lead to new fire starts. The fire will be transitioning from the Northwest Incident Management Team 12 back to the local area tomorrow at 10:00 am.

EVACUATIONS: A level 1 evacuation notification (get ready) remains in place for residences at Ana Estates and along Highway 31, covering two miles north of Forest Road 2901 and extending two miles south of The Lodge at Summer Lake.

RESTRICTIONS: Highway 31 is open with flaggers managing through traffic during fire operations. Motorists should use extra care, expect delays and use alternate routes if possible.

CLOSURES: The Fremont Point Lookout will be closed through August 1 to allow unrestricted suppression and recovery traffic in the area.

SAFETY MESSAGE: With the potential for extreme fire behavior and rapid rates of spread, please be extremely careful when using power tools, firearms and vehicles as well as more traditional sources of fire, such as matches and lighters.

Fire Near NL School

On the afternoon of Sunday, July 9th a wildfire started just south of North Lake School. First reports of the fire came in shortly after 2:00 p.m. At the time, the school was being used as a staging area for personnel fighting the Ana Fire 30 miles to the south. A crew from the Christmas Valley Rural Fire Protection District was dispatched to the scene. With air support diverted from the Ana Fire, the flames were quickly put out, limiting the size of the blaze to about an acre (+/-). 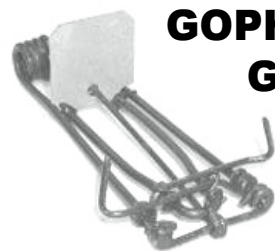

From the Top: Former Neighbors?

Today, people often ask, “Why would anyone want to live on the high desert?” How would you support yourself? Many young people go elsewhere to find work. However, people can and do live and work here. It gets in the blood.

Long before Europeans came here, people chose the areas around Paisley, Fort Rock, and Christmas Valley as their home. People have made what we know as desert home for longer than anyone can remember. Perhaps we even had a prehistoric motel (walktel?) for passers through.

Lake County’s first “motel” was probably in Paisley Cave. How do we know? Like motel visitors today, they left things behind. Like many modern-day motels, this one sat near water. Caves formed the “motel” units. Waves from the then-large Summer Lake had carved the caves. We do know this motel was up and running around 14,000 years ago. The best thing about it: People did not have to pay to stay there. Scientists believe the caves were a stop-off for people on their way to somewhere else. People even brought their dogs

and a few died there. Were they deceased friends or dinner? We cannot know.

What did people leave behind? Think of fossilized sewage. Apparently the septic system dried up. Naturally people discarded unneeded pieces of cord, old weapon points, grinders, and scrapers. Among other things, leftovers remained. The local “restaurants” featured such delicacies as camel, bison, and waterfowl. Where today the deserted motel sits amid the sagebrush, a rich plain once surrounded it along with a living Summer Lake, providing a home for animals, birds, and fish.

Where could these would-have-been neighbors have been going? No one knows, but I like to imagine they were headed for Fort Rock with its lake-front cave with a view—just the place for a cozy semi-tropical winter!

Heat Precautions For Pets

Humane Society of Central Oregon

The Humane Society of Central Oregon (HSCO) would like to offer tips on keeping your pet safe in the heat. With the arrival of extreme heat, the best spot for your pet is inside a safe, cool house. Dogs and cats cannot cool their body temperatures as efficiently as humans.

If your pet is outside during the day, remember to provide protection from the

sun and plenty of fresh water. Remember that older, short muzzle and overweight dogs are more likely to overheat during hot weather. You can provide a wading pool to aid in cooling. Pets need exercise but do it in the cooler hours of the day. Exercise your dog in the morning or evening when temperatures and pavement are cool. The paw pads can get injured from the hot pavement and melted tar can get stuck to pad and hair. Press your hand on pavement for 10 seconds, and if it's not tolerable for you, it's too hot for your pets.

Leaving your pet in a parked car can be a deadly mistake. The temperature inside a car can reach 120 degrees in a few minutes. Even partially open windows won't protect your pet from heatstroke. **Dogs in truck beds can suffer injury or heat stroke.** Veterinarians know all too well dogs that have fallen out of the truck bed which resulted in severely injured dogs or motor vehicle accidents from people swerving to avoid the dog. **If you cannot touch the hot truck bed with your bare hand, your dog should not be on the hot metal.** Debris from the road damages eyes.

"Every year the Humane Society of Central Oregon warns people to keep their pets safe from the dangers of warm temperatures," says Lynne Ouchida, community outreach manager. "Unfortunately, every year we hear of animals needlessly suffering from heat stroke. When summer heat hits, the City of Bend animal control receive four to eight calls per day regarding dogs left in hot cars."

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'Tis the Season for Ticks!

Tick season is primarily early spring and summer but ticks can be found through fall. Ticks can attach to humans and spread diseases like Lymes and Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever. These diseases have been rare in Lake County, but awareness is the best prevention. This article will help you learn to keep ticks off yourself and your pets, remove a tick if it does attach to you, keep the tick for identification if you develop symptoms of a tick borne disease, and also learn the signs of tick born illness.

ABOUT TICKS

There are about 20 different species of hard ticks in Oregon. Of these only 4 are commonly found on humans. Only one in Oregon is known to transmit Lyme disease: the Western Black Legged Tick (*Ixodes pacificus*), more common in Western Oregon. Lyme disease is more common in the eastern states, so if you are visiting there you would have a higher suspicion that a tick bite could be infective. The tick usually must be attached for 24-48 hours before it can pass the bacterium to humans.

Ticks have 3 life stages. Newly hatched larvae are very small (1 mm or 1/16") and only have 6 legs. Adults and nymphs have 8 legs. They mainly attach to animals. They are so small they are hard to detect, even when they are attached. After a blood meal they drop off and change into the 8 legged nymph, (2-3 mm or 1/8"). After a blood meal the nymph drops off and turns into an adult. The females need a large blood meal to allow eggs to develop. Males need smaller, shorter duration meals and spend their time looking for females.

Ticks can't run, fly, or hop, so they climb up things and wait for a host to come by. They can detect a host by vibration, chemical cues and even shadows. They stretch out, hanging on with only 2-4 of their back legs, hoping to snag or drop onto a host (fur, pants, socks, long hair...).

KEEPING TICKS OFF OF YOU

First avoid the areas ticks hang out. Ticks like some humidity, so shade or slightly damp areas are ideal. Walk in the middle of the path away from overhanging grass and shrubbery. Wood piles, fence posts and barns are also potential problem areas. Check yourself often after walking through sagebrush that is thick enough that you are scraping against it.

Dress protectively against ticks whenever you are in a tick-infested or suspect

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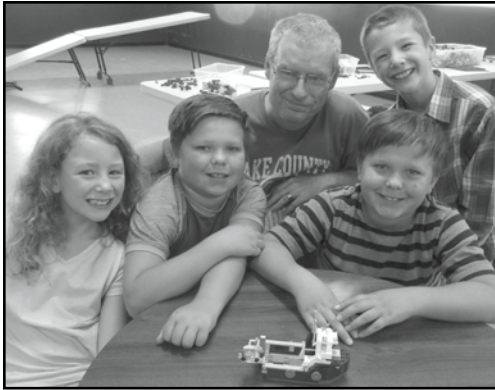

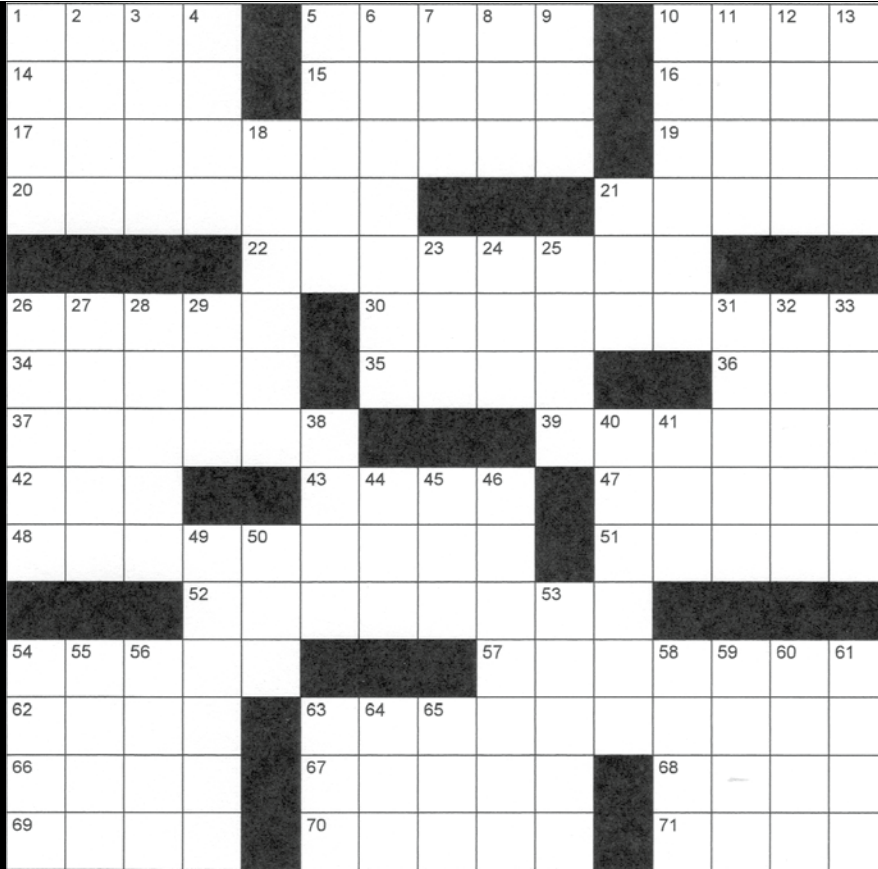

area. Wear long sleeves and pants in light colors so that ticks may be seen easily. Tuck in everything – pant legs into boots or socks, shirt into pants. You may use duct-tape to hold pants and socks together to provide an increased seal. Rubber boots are more slippery than canvas shoes, thus harder for ticks to grab on to. Nylon fabric is likewise more slippery than cotton or polyester. Children should wear clothes with elasticized cuffs on ankles and wrists. Keep your hair tied back. Apply repellents according to directions. DEET or Permethrin are the best repellents, but must be used carefully. Apply Permethrin only to clothing, socks and shoes (read the label as it can damage some nylons). Always wash your hands after applying repellent.

HOMEMADE TICK/FLY SPRAY

There are many alternatives to DEET and Permethrin marketed, but they are less effective and have to be reapplied often, but are less toxic. Skin-So-Soft seems to make the skin so slippery it is hard for insects to hang on. It is generally more effective against mosquitoes and midges, but here is a recipe claiming to be effective for ticks and flies: 2 cups white vinegar, 1 cup Avon Skin-So-Soft bath oil, 1 cup water, 1 tablespoon eucalyptus oil.

BE OBSERVANT

When you are in tick habitat inspect your clothing every two to three hours for ticks. They usually wander around for about an hour before they attach. Inspect your body when you get home (at least once a day). Most of the diseases require that the tick be attached 24-48 hours before the diseases are transmitted, so the

sooner you remove them, the less likely you will be infected. Pay attention to skin creases, armpits and groin, hairy areas like the neck and hairline; look with a mirror in hard-to-see places. Teach kids to check themselves, their companions and siblings.

Consult your veterinarian for information on treatments for pets, like Frontline. Keep your outdoor clothes tied up in a plastic bag until they are ready to be washed.

IF YOU GET A TICK BITE

If you get a tick bite, it is a good idea to make a few notes about it so you can tell your medical providers if illness is a result of the bite. Note: 1) The date, 2) Where the tick was from, and 3) Whether the tick was flat or full (engorged) or how long the tick may have been attached. The symptoms are often vague, and the history and timing of a tick bite can speed the diagnosis of tick born disease.

HOW TO REMOVE A TICK

1. Use tweezers or forceps. This allows you to get close to the head, avoid getting bacteria on your fingers, and to avoid squeezing the tick and causing them to regurgitate gut content, which may contain bacteria. DO NOT use alcohol, nail polish, hot matches, petroleum jelly, etc. to remove ticks as these methods may also traumatize the tick and cause regurgitation of infected material and increases your chance of infection.

2. Grasp the mouth parts or head end as close to the skin as possible.

3. Gently pull the tick straight out, steadily and firmly.

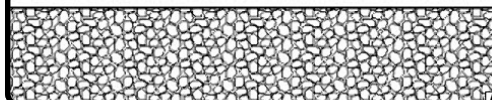
4. The mouth parts are barbed like a harpoon and may break off in the skin. They contain no bacteria, but may act like a sliver and get infected, if the break off.

5. Wash your hands and the bite area with soap and water; apply an antiseptic to the bite area. Use Care not to spread disease when disposing of the tick. For example, the old and unsafe methods of placing the tick on the stove and watching it “pop” could cause its infectious gut bacteria to be airborne and inhaled.

6. Keep the tick specimen for the next 4 weeks in case you need to have it identified. Be sure to label and date the container. You can place the tick in a baggy or vial with a cotton ball or paper towel slightly moistened – this keeps the tick alive and hydrated which makes it easier to find the bacterium that causes Lyme disease.

Suicide Warning Signs

These signs may mean someone is at risk for suicide. Risk is greater if a behavior is new or has increased and if it seems related to a painful event, loss, or change.

- Talking about wanting to die or to kill oneself.
- Looking for a way to kill oneself, such as searching online or buying a gun.
- Talking about feeling hopeless or having no reason to live.
- Talking about feeling trapped or in unbearable pain.
- Talking about being a burden to others.
- Increasing the use of alcohol or drugs.
- Acting anxious or agitated; behaving recklessly.
- Sleeping too little or too much.

North Lake County Flash Back to February 1963



Lake Co. Officials Approve Forming Recreation District

The Christmas Valley Recreation District, which was formed January 11, 1963 by the unanimous vote of local residents, was officially approved by high ranking Lake County officials Judge C. W. Ogle and Commissioners James Snyder and J. D. Corum.

The Recreation District, which is governed by a three-man board of Christmas Valley residents, thus becomes the official operating body within this area.

It can set up the budget for the year, institute various planning operations and programs to provide leadership for the growth and development of Christmas Valley.

The CVRD commission consists of Warren Morton, John Pettus and Charles Selby. The Recreation District is a vehicle to provide for the future development of recreational facilities, youth programs, parks, playgrounds, street maintenance and other community activities in Christmas Valley.

The Recreation District also will consider management procedures of the \$100,000 Christmas Valley Lodge, the 9-hole golf course, the big Christmas Valley Lake and the modern Air Park.

These facilities are to be turned over to the Recreation District for a token consideration by the M. Penn Phillips Co., developers of this rapidly growing community.

This procedure is standard practice for M. Penn Phillips, chairman of the board. This method of governing has been suc-

cessful at other Phillips developments of Hesperia and Salton City in California.

Mr. Phillips explained his philosophy thusly: "We believe, in view of our extensive experience, that recreational facilities are perhaps the major factor in bringing new residents to a new community. We also feel that the public interests are best served when these facilities are owned and operated by local residents." He pointed out that Christmas Valley residents will own and operate some of the finest improvements without the excessive fiscal burden of building and developing them.

New Recreation District to Build Softball Diamond

Perhaps inspired by the distant cries of "play ball" in the training camps of Florida, Arizona and California, the Board of Directors of the Christmas Valley Recreation District voted to build a softball diamond here. You must admit that the Directors, who just were elected on Jan. 11, certainly didn't waste any time getting their first project underway. The softball diamond will be built on the school site, which is located south and east of the town-site.

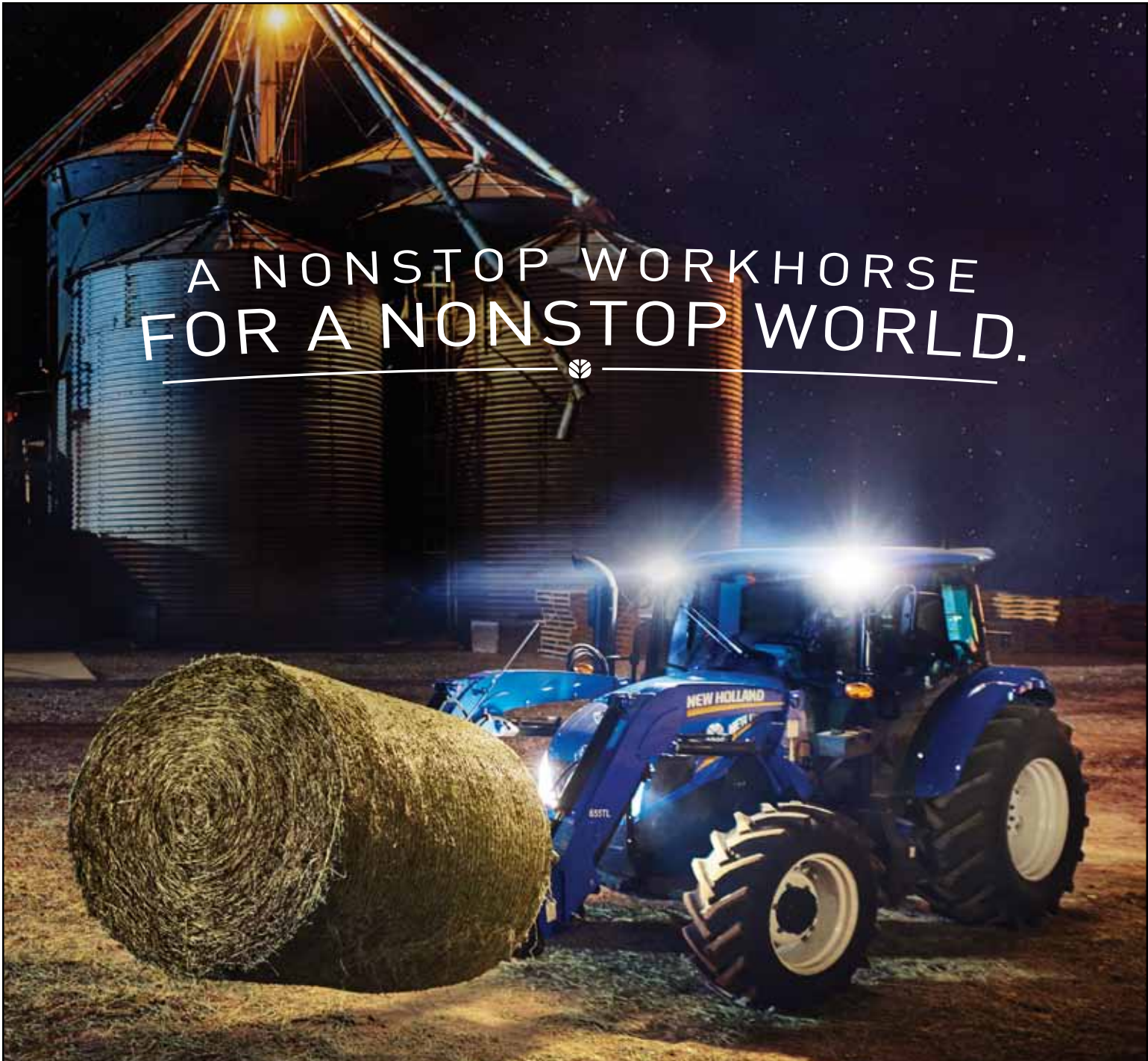
