


niors: for the whole community to come together and fellowship and support one another.



Back in Thyme Herbals: It's About Gout

ARE A) YOU NEE

I have been asked about gout a lot lately. Specifically about how to ease the pain, where it comes from, and how to get rid of it.

Gout is one of the most painful of the rheumatic diseases, caused by deposits of needlelike crystals of uric acid in the connective tissue, joint spaces, or both. The joint most commonly effected first is the big toe. This is called podagra. Inflammation is initiated by deposition of uric acid from the bloodstream in the joint. When these crystals are injested by white blood cells, the cells release enzymes that generate inflammation. Uric acid is a naturally occurring substance of the chemical breakdown of the purine bases that compose the genetic material DNA. As cells die and release DNA from their chromosomes, purines are converted into uric that is excreted in the urine, and through the intestinal tract. If the body increases its production of uric acid, or the kidneys don't eliminate enough uric acid, it builds up causing a condition called hyperuricemia, a form of early gout. This condition can also occur when a person eats too many high-purine foods, such as liver, dried beans and peas, anchovies, and gravies. Uric acid crystals can collect in the kidneys and cause kidney stones.

Risk factors for developing hyperuricemia and gout can be genetics, obesity (excessive food intake increases the body's production of uric acid), over consumption of alcohol (interferes with the elimination of uric acid), over eating purine-rich foods, an enzyme defect that interferes with break down of purines, exposure to lead, co-existing medical conditions, and certain medicines including: diuretics, salicylates (aspirin), niacin, cyclosporine and levadopa.

Treatments for gout include some diuretics which help flush urates from body (herbal diuretics are recommended), and anti-inflammatories help some. Drink six pints of liquid a day. Slightly alkaline, natural spring water is recommended. Avoid al-

cohol. Eat raw fruits, veggies, grains, seeds and nuts, exercise regularly and maintain a healthy weight.

Cherries are very effective in lowering acid levels, as well as hawthorn berries, blueberries, and any other dark red-blue berries. Herbs that help are the young leaves and twigs of birch, wild carrot (a diuretic), white willow (an anti-inflammatory). Apple cider vinegar once a day destroys crystals! Alfalfa, buckthorn, comfrey root, corn silk, couch grass, dandelion, fennel, horseradish root, oat straw, parsley, pennyroyal, primrose, and safflower are extremely good; as are sarsaparella, St. Johns wort, wood betony, yellow dock, and yucca.

From The Top: Fluid Time

I think I have a bone to pick with Benjamin Franklin. While serving as U.S. envoy to France he wrote a satirical article on saving candle wax in Paris. Among other things he suggested setting clocks ahead an hour, giving more daylight in the winter evenings. He never expected anyone to take him seriously, but nonetheless he put the idea out there and it stayed.

More than a century later - in 1895 - a man named George Hudson actually proposed the idea. Fortunately for the world, nothing happened. However, at the end of April in 1916 Germany and the Austro-Hungarian Empire began using daylight-saving time.

Here in the United States we began to try out daylight-saving time in 1918 during World War I. Congress legally confirmed national time zones, then declared daylight-saving time. People did not like it! After the war ended, congress voted to end daylight time. Woodrow Wilson vetoed the bill—and got overridden. For the next few years daylight-saving time became an option. West of the Mississippi very few states or cities adopted it. During the late 1950s time in summer varied from town to town in Oregon. On her first job, management told my sister she could chose which time she worked on. For outdoor workers like farmers and loggers, DST meant they had to get up about 3:00 AM. Some log dumps operated on DST, which forced loggers to quit work while light remained. I lived through this and what a mess it was! Oregon governor Mark Hatfield had a hand in all this confusion. I always thought that when he went to congress he mucked things up for the entire country.

By 1966 freight companies found the hit or miss approach to time zones hard to deal with. They lobbied for and got federal DST control. From my point of view, that helped. At least I did not have to set my watch ahead or back when I went to town. However, where is the logic? Why not have summer hours for urban businesses? Coming and going an hour early would have the same effect. As things are now, when we "spring forward" heart attacks increase

across the country. I suspect no one likes to change and reset clocks. Most people I've talked to would prefer one time all year. Some would prefer daylight and others standard time. In Christmas Valley time has little bearing on when farmers work. Hay cutting happens when the dew comes in regardless of the time of day. It stops when it's too dry. Other tasks happen when it's light. Who cares what time it is!

I lived in Indiana when I married. In those days my part of Indiana had opted out of daylight-saving time. We lived on Eastern standard time, but 50 miles away, South Bend was on Central time. It had its advantages. We received network TV from both time zones. If something interrupted us during a TV program all we had to do was change stations and get it the next hour.

Then one year the entire state switched to Eastern time. The same year we went on daylight-saving time. Our brother-in-law had to put his clock forward two hours at once. By that time I believed that switching times was for the birds.

So that's why I have a bone to pick with Ben Franklin and George Hudson. I'm not too happy with Kaiser Wilhelm of WW I infamy either. If I could I would settle this in the true American way: I would sue them all. Anybody want to join me in a class-action suit?




