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

Safely Viewing the August 21st Eclipse

Looking directly at the sun is unsafe except during the brief total phase of a solar eclipse ("totality"), when the moon entirely blocks the sun's bright face, which will happen only within the narrow path of totality.

The only safe way to look directly at the uneclipsed or partially eclipsed sun is through special-purpose solar filters, such as "eclipse glasses" or hand-held solar viewers. Homemade filters or ordinary sunglasses, even very dark ones, are not safe for looking at the sun; they transmit thousands of times too much sunlight.

Always inspect your solar filter before use; if scratched or damaged, discard it. Read and follow any instructions printed on or packaged with the filter. Always supervise children using solar filters. Stand still and cover your eyes with your eclipse glasses or solar viewer before looking up

at the bright sun. After looking at the sun, turn away and remove your filter — do not remove it while looking at the sun.

Do not look at the uneclipsed or partially eclipsed sun through an unfiltered camera, telescope, binoculars, or other optical device. Similarly, do not look at the sun through a camera, a telescope, binoculars, or any other optical device while using your eclipse glasses or hand-held solar viewer — the concentrated solar rays will damage the filter and enter your eye(s), causing serious injury.

Seek expert advice from an astronomer before using a solar filter with a camera, a telescope, binoculars, or any other optical device. Note that solar filters must be attached to the front of any telescope, binoculars, camera lens, or other optics.

move your solar filter only when the moon completely covers the sun's bright face and it suddenly gets quite dark. Experience totality, then, as soon as the bright sun begins to reappear, replace your solar viewer to look at the remaining partial phases.

Outside the path of totality, you must always use a safe solar filter to view the sun directly.

If you normally wear eyeglasses, keep them on. Put your eclipse glasses on over them, or hold your handheld viewer in front of them.

Note: If your eclipse glasses or viewers are compliant with the ISO 12312-2 safety

standard, you may look at the uneclipsed or partially eclipsed Sun through them for as long as you wish. Furthermore, if the filters aren't scratched, punctured, or torn, you may reuse them indefinitely. Some glasses/viewers are printed with warnings stating that you shouldn't look through them for more than 3 minutes at a time and that you should discard them if they are more than 3 years old. Such warnings are outdated and do not apply to eclipse viewers compliant with the ISO 12312-2 standard adopted in 2015.

An alternative method for safe viewing of the partially eclipsed sun is pinhole projection (Google it). Or just look at the shadow of a leafy tree during the partial eclipse; you'll see the ground dappled with crescent suns projected by the tiny spaces between the leaves.

A solar eclipse is one of nature's grandest spectacles. By following these simple rules, you can safely enjoy the view and be rewarded with memories to last a lifetime.



Learning and Working Online

Many local jobs are seasonal in nature. Consequently, making ends meet in the winter can be extremely rough. But that is not the only reason someone in this area would choose to find virtual employment or prepare for such employment through online education. Whatever reasons a person might have, more and more jobs are becoming available online. According to the website worldwidelearn.com, one of the five largest trends affecting the job market is "distributed work," and of course, telecommuting falls into that category. Last year, U.S. News suggested that traditional job seekers seek out virtual employment, explaining that lack of geographical boundaries associated with jobs make getting hired easier. If you want to work online, but don't have the skills or education to pursue the job you want, online education provides amazing opportunities for those who prefer to stay in the area. While few go to Yale for the cost of a new car, a solid, accredited education can still be had for much less than the average American pays for college.

There's a lot to all of this, though, and doing real life and real important stuff in the virtual world isn't for everyone. Preparation for work in the virtual world is often key to losing that overwhelming feeling of otherworldliness that the idea might produce. Being able to spot online employment scams is necessary. Start with the information found at:

http://ratracerebellion.com/spotting-scams/ Additionally, if your internet skills are lacking, *Udemy.com* can help with numerous internet skills related courses. If you don't have any experience working online, volunteermatch.org has virtual opportunities. If you attend college online, many departments provide valuable experience through extracurricular activities.

I'm in my final semester of higher education and won't look for work until it's done, but I sure have researched the subject a lot. The Rat Race Rebellion (*ratracerebellion.com*) website has been on my radar for years. Founded way back in 1999, they pro-

vide daily listings of work from home jobs. One of their founders, Christine Durst, is also the author of the books Ten-Second Commute and Work at Home Now. Work at Home Now is filled with great information for any would-be telecommuter. Ten-Second Commute is geared towards those looking to work as virtual assistants. Flexjobs.com, a searchable online service for screened jobs, costs \$50 per year or around \$15 per month to use. The nice thing with Flexjobs is that in the job search, the job seeker can choose the level of telecommuting that they want out of a job, from some telecommuting to 100% telecommuting. Wahm.com provides only listings for workat-home jobs. Other virtual job search options include doing a regular search for "online job listings," "virtual jobs," and the like. There are more job search sites specific to telecommuting; I've included those I have confidence in. It is also possible to find virtual positions through the big job sites like Monster and Indeed. Adding words like "virtual" or "telecommute" to a "customer service" search, for instance, might yield virtual customer service jobs. The trick here is often just varying word choices. The situation is often much like searching on eBay: if a person who created a job ad called it "virtual customer service" and you're searching for "customer service from home," you may not find their ad.

Many online jobs don't require a college education, but all the best search tips in the world won't land anyone a job that they don't qualify for. Remember that while virtual employment gives job seekers the opportunity to search the world for jobs, it also gives employers the chance to review a tremendous number of qualified applicants. The days of winning a job with a handshake and a smile never existed in the realm of virtual employment and I'm exceptionally grateful: those of us with more ability to research than showcase our winning personalities needed a break. But and here's something I do know about from experience - not all online education-

Back In Thyme Herbals: Arborvitae

I will now begin listing some of the essential oils and their uses. I am amazed at the benefits of some of the oils that plants produce! I have always wondered about Arborvitae (Thuja plicata) and what uses it could have. I have found it to be very useful in many ways. It does not grow very well out here due to the lack of humidity in the air. It is of the Cupressaceae (conifer: cypress) family. The extraction method is steam distillation from the heartwood. The common primary uses both aromatical and topical are antibacterial, antifungal, anticancer (disolves tumors). It is also an antiseptic, antitumor, astringent, expectorant and a stimulant of the nervous system, uterus, and heart muscles. Aromatically calming and as a natural insect repellant.

In history the Arborvitae, or western red cedar, was referred to as the "Tree of Life," used by ancient civilizations to enhance their potential for spiritual communication during rituals and other ceremonies. It was also used for coughs, fevers, intestinal parasites, cystitis and venereal diseases. This oil also may help with hair loss, nourishing the skin, rheumatism, sun protection, warts and psoriasis. It has powerful effects on the subconscious and unconscious mind. The aromatic influences are calming and may help enhance spiritual awareness or meditation. Not recommended for oral use and use with caution during pregnancy. For topical and aromatic use only, use sparingly and dilute. Blends well with Birch, Cedar wood, cassia and eucalyptus.

al experiences are created equal and having access to so many universities can mean a significantly lower tuition bill.

Still, cheap or not, regional accreditation is the standard. Schools without regional accreditation can be acceptable when you already have a degree from a regionally accredited institution, but this tends to vary from field to field – researching yours is a good idea before choosing a school. The Department of Education maintains a database of regionally accredited institutions that can be found here: https://ope.ed.gov/accreditation/.

Higher education often feels costprohibitive, but it doesn't have to be. My master's degree was completed through Western New Mexico University for about \$10,000 that I could spend twenty-five years paying back (keeping the monthly payment super-low, but increasing the actual cost of the degree significantly). Klamath Community College provides several online associate's degree options at community college prices. Fort Hays State University has multiple bachelor's and master's degree programs starting at just over \$200 per credit. My reading leads me to believe that just about any regionally accredited university in New Mexico has exceptionally low tuition if an online student is willing to attend part-time. Doing searches for low cost tuition and the like is great, but don't believe the tuition rates published anywhere but on a university's website - these numbers should be current, accurate, and take into account in-state and out-of-state student status.

That's what I think I know. I'll know more in January when I put nearly a decade's worth of research to the test. I do know this now, however: I worked in the public against medical advice for nearly a decade and a half. Two years of extracurricular activity through my graduate school and a lot of research convinced me that I spent all my days at work doing it wrong: exacerbating chronic health issues is no way to suffer through to retirement. For some, the virtual world provides much better alternatives. No, these types of opportunities are not for everyone, but they'll still be here tomorrow if you happen to change your mind.

Clinton Lloyd Basey — January 10, 1924 to July 18, 2017



At the age of 93, Clinton Lloyd Basey rode off into the sunset atop his favorite bay gelding for the final time July 18, 2017 in Bend, Oregon. Not really the end for Clinton, but rather a new beginning, being reunited in Heaven with his wife Mary Ann and most of his contemporaries. The picture is clear, Clinton walking through the Pearly Gates and having to push aside Mary Ann's brother and sisters, who are having a nice visit, in order to get to Mary Ann!

Clinton was born January 10, 1924 in Silver Lake, Oregon where he eventually also "retired" after 60 plus years on Klamath Marsh. Most of that life was spent on or around horses. After a brief stint on Rodman Rock Fire Lookout as a teen, Clinton could not stand watching the dust clouds from the cows trailing across the desert and not being part of it. That was as far as he ever strayed from the Cowboy lifestyle. During his final years in Silver Lake, we would get reports that he was seen bareback on one of his horses rounding up a couple of strays separated while moving through town, or someone would have seen him riding (weaving) on his bike to the P.O. to get the mail. Up to his final days in Silver Lake, his horses were a priority, fed before he was, even weakening in his old age and feeding them carrots. "Damn spoiled horses," he could be heard saying.

Clinton was known as the Mayor of Klamath Marsh, but he actually wore so many hats to so many people that it

changed from one day to the next. Whether it was plowing a road out for one neighbor, or having just the right tool or bolt for another, there seemed to be a constant flow of visitors, neighbors, friends and family in and out of the Kittredge Place on Klamath Marsh. The flow usually started with best friend Ernie

Messner at about 4:00 a.m. for coffee and might go until midnight, when one of the many nieces and nephews might be pulling in for a weekend visit. Mary Ann (O'Keeffe), Clinton's wife of over 60 years was nothing if not the "Queen of the Marsh" (She would scold me for saying that). She kept the weight on many a lonesome ranch hand and his new bride, neighbor or relatives with her ability to create something out of nothing and feed anyone who stopped by.

To most of us kids, Clinton was just "Unc" or "Uncle". To some he was the father we did not ever get to know. He taught us about life, commitment, accountability and with the boys, how to be a man. He taught us how to straighten nails, ride horses, build fences, gig frogs, shoot guns, straighten more nails, ride 3 wheelers, buckaroo wrestle, chew Copenhagen, fish, throw a rope, braid leather, separate horse hair for a mecate, stretch covote hides, crack a whip, fix things, play endless pranks, ride the bucking barrel, work cows, and placate the boss (Mary Ann). The list is as long as your arm for the many nieces and nephew and their friends who were blessed to spend time with Clinton and Mary Ann. He was quick to laugh, had a mischievous twinkle in his eye and to a person he taught us all to have fun and not take life too seriously.

From my earliest days, my memory is of a nonstop string of visitors, and his attraction to visitors young and old did not wane, over the years. Many a time in his older years, he would laugh his way through a

conversation with someone who had made the pilgrimage to visit him, only to tell me "he was not sure" who he had spent the last hour talking too. This was more of a reflection of all the people whom he had influenced, rather than a sign of aging.

Clinton is a hero to many of us kids whom he helped raise. He was the embodiment of the Cowboy lifestyle that we so cherish in America. He was an independent, self-made man who in our young minds could do anything. His legacy will live on for generations to come. Clinton never "officially" finished high school, but understood the value of education. Very humbly he started the "Clinton and Mary Ann Basey Scholarship" at North Lake High School. Their scholarship funds three students per year to achieve their college education. Proudly, Clinton has funded this scholarship into perpetuity for many years of NLHS Cowboys for years to come.

Clinton and Mary Ann never were able to have their own kids, but had a large part in helping bring up many nieces and nephews. There were the Currie kids (Colene, Cathleen, Brenda and John) the O'Keeffe kids (Kevin, Michael, Peggy, Terry, Pat, and Danny), the Schroeder kids (Jeanne and Marion Lee), and special ranch hand step son (Kenny Ghiametti). From these nieces and nephews sprang 2 generations of kids who all have been touched by Clinton and Mary Ann. Mary Ann who passed away 14 years ago has no surviving siblings (Eugene O'Keeffe, Josephine Schroeder, and Joan Currie (Poppe). Clinton is survived by two sisters (Lorena May Emery and Barbara Harper).

A Celebration of Life remembrance will be held in the fall in Bend, Oregon. Further details of that will be communicated in the near future. Water District Eases Summer Restrictions


Last month DESERT WHISPERS published a notice from the Christmas Valley Domestic Water Supply District which placed restrictions on water usage within the township.


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Policy: Animals on Park and Rec Properties

North Lake Park and Recreation District has adopted a policy concerning pets/animals on Park and Rec properties. This policy is an attempt to keep our facilities an enjoyable place for all users.

Some flying clubs purchase an airplane for members to use, which lowers the cost of purchasing and maintaining a plane because the costs are shared by the members.

Webbon held an initial information meeting on Saturday, August 12, at the Lake County Airport in Lakeview. The meeting was to gauge potential members' interests and to discuss organizational options and potential scope of activities. A second meeting sometime in September is being planned.

Smokey Air, Extreme Heat May Cause Problems

Public health officials want to remind people across the state to take precautions as smoke from multiple wildfires around Oregon and Washington affects the air quality. The combination of high temperatures and wildfire smoke around area may increase the risk of illness especially for older adults, young children, and people with asthma, respiratory, or heart condi-

Officials urge all residents to take the following precautions to avoid health problems during hot, smoky conditions. Reduce the amount of time spent outdoors. This can usually provide some protection, especially in a tightly closed, air-conditioned house in which the air conditioner can be set to re-circulate air instead of bringing in outdoor air. Reduce the amount of time engaged in vigorous outdoor physical activity. This can be an important and effective strategy to decrease exposure to

inhaled air pollutants and minimize health risks during a smoke event. Reduce other sources of indoor air pollution such as burning cigarettes and candles; using gas, propane, and wood burning stoves and furnaces; cooking; and vacuuming.

Individuals with heart disease or lung diseases such as asthma should follow their health care providers' advice about prevention and treatment of symptoms. Remember to stay hydrated. Drink between 2-4 cups of water per hour if working outdoors. Apply sunscreen with SPF15 or more 10 minutes before going out; reapply every two hours. Wear loose, lightweight, light-colored clothing. Take cool showers to lower your body temperature. Never leave infants, children, or pets in a parked car. Always wear a life jacket if you are on the water. Remember to be safe around water. Check on at-risk friends, family, and neighbors. Know symptoms of Heat Exhaustion (heavy sweating, weakness, pale and clammy, fainting and vomiting). Know symptoms of Heat Stroke (high body temperature, hot and dry skin, rapid pulse) and call for help.





From the Top: Meet the "Neighbors"

Imagine a large extended family seeking a snug winter home for all of its members. Their house hunt started sometime between 15,000 and 9,000 years ago. Who knows where they actually came from. Perhaps they had stopped for the night at the Paisley Cave. If so the next day the group trekked north through a land of marshes and small lakes, rich with fish and birds. Winding through valleys, crossing Picture Rock Pass, and bypassing Silver Lake they came in view of Fort Rock. They found no home there, but not far away they found their perfect place—a wide-mouthed cave. There was room for everyone, and a small fire-pit near the entry would would warm the cave without too much smoke. Looking out from their entry they could see the small lakes and marshes that would provide their winter food. Satisfied, they moved in.

How did the people in this winter house pass their time? Men hunted and fished. Women cared for children and prepared meals. They had brought their kitchen appliances and hunting weapons with them. They had a handheld grinding stone, chipped stone scrapers, and for the hunters, points for their weapons. No one had heard of dump sites. As sandals wore out, the residents simply stacked them together out of the way. Over the years they accumulated about 70 pairs. After a while the family no longer wintered in their almost "beach house." The cave may have lain empty. Thousands of years passed.

Nearly 7000 years ago, Mount Mazama erupted, covering much of Central Oregon with a layer of volcanic ash. The ash covered the remnants of the people's possessions. During the late 1800s and early 1900s, settlers cattle took over the cave for shelter from the freezing wind, leaving behind a layer of manure.

Those early settlers remained forgotten until 1938 when Luther Cressman, a U of O professor came exploring. He found the cave and dug through the layer of manure. Then he found the volcanic ash. What else might he find? He kept digging. Sure enough his curiosity paid off; he found the stack of worn-out sandals as well as other items the former tenants had used. Cressman felt sure they were ancient. His colleagues didn't think so. Cressman had to wait about 9 years to prove his point. When people learned to do carbon dating, the sandals came in at about 9,000 years old. No one had even known that anyone lived in Oregon that long ago.

No one had ever seen anything like those sandals. Sagebrush-bark twined cords formed the sole. Thinner twined cords formed the straps and toe flap. Likely the original owners wore them in winter. When they lived in the cave Central Oregon still enjoyed a semi-tropical climate.

In 1966 and 1967 Cressman returned with a graduate student named Stephen Bedwell. Bedwell discovered a set of tools. One cannot carbon-date stone, but the men also found a hearth. The ashes there were dated at 15,000 years go. Not all archaeologists agree with this, but it is possible. We know that people camped at the Paisley cave that long ago. The two archaeologists also found evidence that people still used the cave as recently as 5,000 years ago.

I wonder what those ancient people would think if they could see Fort Rock Valley now. I also wonder what we would see if we could travel back in time and see these people during their daily lives. Could we survive and live as comfortably as they did? At any rate, I, for one, would love to meet those early settlers and almostneighbors. It would be something to get a glimpse of their world.




