

Dental Van is Coming <u>Soon to Christmas Vly</u>

The Dental Van and its personnel provide free dental care to low-income individuals with urgent needs. Qualifications for this program fall under the Federal Poverty Guidelines. Patients need to meet a certain financial criteria as well as have no dental insurance or access to dental care. Dental extractions, fillings and xrays are procedures typically done with state-of-the-art equipment.

The Dental Van runs at a cost of \$600.00 per day. Dr. Spencer Krueger DDS and his wife Mary LeFevre, PharmD, graciously volunteer their time, but donations are critical in order to keep this service returning. Thankfully, the bulk of financial assistance is from the Christmas Valley Community Church. Back in Thyme Herbals: Rosemary

This genus of evergreen shrubs contains two species, native to dry, rocky woodlands and scrub, often in costal areas around the Mediterranean. Opinion differs on the number of species of the genus, some regard R. officinalis as the only species. The facts show that there are many because of the cultivation that has produced many variations world-wide as garden and container plants.

Rosemary is a symbol of friendship, loyalty, and remembrance in many parts of the world. In ancient Greece, rosemary was said to strength-

en the memory. Students of the (Rosmarinus officinalis L.) time wore sprigs of the herb in their hair while they studied to help with their concen-

tration. Brides wore it to show that they would always remember their families, and the dead were buried with it to signify that they would never be forgotten. In the 14th century Queen Isabella of Hungary claimed that at the age of 72 years, when crippled with gout and rheumatism, she had so regained her strength and beauty by using Hungary water (rosemary tops macerated with alcohol) that the King of Poland proposed to her.

Over the centuries people found a host of benefits in the plant. According to one belief rosemary could incapacitate a robber - "Wash the feet of the thief with a lotion made from the root and he will be deprived of the strength to steal." The aromatic branches were burned as a disinfectant against rampant diseases and the apothecaries of the 16th and 17th centuries prescribed it for the relief of intestinal gas and as a tonic and digestive aid. Different preparations of the plant were used for toothache, headache, gout, coughs and baldness. It has long been used as an antispasmodic (as in vertigo).

Rosemary contains volatile oil, flavonoids, and phenolic acids, which are



Linda McCoslin strongly antiseptic and antiinflammatory. Other constituents include: tannins, which are astringent, rosemaricine, which has stimulant and pain killing effects; and rosmarinic acid, an anti-inflammatory that has potential in the treatment of toxic shock syndrome. The flavonoid diosmin is more effective than RUTIN in reducing capillary fragility.

"Rosmarinus" is from the Latin for "dew of the sea," referring to the dew like appearance of its pale

blue flowers from a distance. The leaves and flowering tops are collected in the spring and early summer and distilled for oil, or dried for infusions, de-

coctions, extracts, spirits and tinctures.

Rosemary is used internally for depression, apathy, nervous exhaustion, headaches, and migraines associated with nervous tension or feeling cold, poor circulation, and digestive problems associated with anxiety.

CAUTION: Excess use causes abortion in pregnant women and convulsions.





All rides must have a Senior or Disabled person being transported.



PLAYA's Executive Director to Retire



Deborah Ford, **PLAYA's** Executive Director is retiring in May after almost four years leading the non-profit. PLA-YA, a residency program for artists and scientists was the extraordinary vision of

Ford

Julie Bryant and Bill Roach, and founded in May 2011. Deborah Ford was hired in 2013 and has provided exceptional leadership for the program bringing artists and scientists from around the world to Summer Lake to work on their creative research unencumbered.

Since her tenure began Ford has increased the quantity and quality of residents participating in PLAYA's program to over 170 residents per year, including recipients of Guggenheim, Fulbright and Pulitzer awards. PLAYA has become a leader among residency programs with the inclusion of welcoming scientists and encouraging interaction and collaboration between various disciplines.

Ford has greatly expanded funding support for it's programming with grants from the National Endowment for the Arts, Oregon Cultural Trust, Oregon Arts Commission, Oregon Humanities, Libraries of Eastern Oregon and as a recipient of the Golden Spot award from the Ford Family Foundation. In addition, this year PLAYA will welcome their first Creative Access Residents through a partnership with the Alliance of Artist Com-

munities and the Craig H. Neilsen Foundation, serving artists and writers with spinal chord injuries.

Lake County and other regions within Oregon benefit significantly from PLA-YA's residency program through monthly PLAYA Presents (open studios and readings), traveling exhibits, publications and other public performances held throughout the region. Each resident spends from 2-8 weeks onsite and many are enthusiastic about working within the local community. PLAYA is excited about announcing and welcoming a new director in the coming weeks and continuing to provide a strong cultural resource for Lake County. 

Ellen Waterston of Bend, Oregon, as the next Executive Director. She will assume her new post April 28, 2017.

In addition to her work as an awardwinning author and poet, Waterston has significant experience in private, public, and nonprofit sector work. Her credentials include Waterston Communications, Inc, a strategic planning and communications company; Writing Ranch, offering retreats and workshops for emerging and established writers since 2000; Waterston Desert Writing Prize, a three-year-old nonprofit annually recognizing an author for a nonfiction book proposal on any desert worldwide; and The Nature of Words, a literary arts non-profit based in Bend which Waterston started in 2002 and directed for eleven years. As an author, she has published three volumes of poetry and two nonfiction titles. Her fourth collection of poems, Hotel Domilocos, will be released from Moonglade Press in April 2017.

Waterston replaces Executive Director Deborah Ford who is retiring after almost four years at the helm. Ford has attracted significant funding for PLAYA's programs and has expanded the organization's support of innovative thinking in the arts and sciences through both traditional and thematic residencies as well as symposia and workshops. She and her husband will return to their home in Montana where Ford will resume her work as a sought-after contemporary photographer.

"Transition and growth are the cornerstones of PLAYA's mission encouraging dialogue between the arts and sciences," states PLAYA Board Chair Richard Wilhelm. "The transition from the leadership of Deborah Ford to Ellen Waterston marks a new chapter in PLAYA's growth. PLAYA's Board of Directors deeply appreciates Deb for her commitment to our mission. It has been our great honor and pleasure to work with her. As we say goodbye to Deb, we enthusiastically welcome Ellen as PLAYA's next Executive Director. Drawing upon her

life-long devotion to the arts and extensive experience leading highly successful private, public, and non-profit organizations, Ellen will steer the growth of PLAYA, and we are thrilled."

PLAYA was the vision of founders Julie Bryant and Bill Roach who first opened PLAYA's doors to residents in 2011. "As one who has personally benefitted from residencies at PLAYA I know how important retreats like this are for artists and scientists," says Waterston. "I am honored to do my part to grow PLAYA's base of support and to broaden PLAYA's reach and am deeply grateful to the founders, Julie Bryant and Bill Roach, to the Board of Directors, for giving me this opportunity, and to Deb Ford for setting the bar so high! I hope to sustain and build on the momentum she created."

Waterston joins John Martin, also of Bend, who was hired as Residency Manager in February 2017. A published poet and former owner of John Martin Landscaping, Martin coordinates all residency-related scheduling and activities. Site Assistant, Kris Norris, and Facilities Manager, Michael Norris, round out the on-site team. The couple has been involved with PLAYA since its inception.

Policy: Animals on Park and Rec Properties

North Lake Park and Recreation District has adopted a policy concerning pets/ animals on Park and Rec properties. This policy is an attempt to keep our facilities an enjoyable place for all users.

When on North Lake Park and Recreation property (including the Rodeo Grounds, Golf Course, Play Area, ect.) all domestic animals, whether pets, livestock, or other, must be leashed and/or under the direct control and supervision of their owner/handler. Any defecation (poop) from the animal must be cleaned up immediately by the owner/handler. Individuals failing to comply with this policy will be asked to leave Park and Rec property.


Animals freely roaming, with no apparent owner/handler in the area may be treated as strays. The proper authorities will then be contacted.

Prescribed Burn Fire <u>Season to Begin</u>

As spring temperatures increase and snow levels begin to recede, but while humidity levels remain high, Fire managers at the South Central Oregon Fire Management Partnership (SCOFMP) will be taking the opportunity to begin prescribed burning.

Area residents and visitors may notice smoke on public lands in various areas during the next few months as part of the continued commitment to protect communities and natural resources from wildfires.

Prescribed burns are a proactive tool used to achieve a number of purposes, including the reduction of hazardous fuels (overgrown vegetation). They can help decrease the threat of high intensity, highseverity wildfires; reduce the risk of insect and disease outbreak; recycle nutrients that increase soil productivity; and improve wildlife habitat.

During the prescribed burning season fire crews also burn piles of wood debris and fuel that are the result of fuel reduction activities in the forest. The spring prescribed burning season lasts as long as weather permits, which may be a few weeks or months, depending on conditions. The burning operations are monitored and patrolled frequently to ensure public safety.

Prescribed burning announcements will be placed at local ranger stations and federal offices prior to ignition. Fremont-Winema National Forest, BLM Lakeview District and Sheldon-Hart Mountain employees are committed to a safe and successful prescribed burning season for both the public and employees.


